To celebrate the Year Three and Four students' creative pursuits in Dance this year, family members were invited into Limerock Hall to view their child's Dance/Drama lesson. The aim of each class was to explore ideas through the creative process, rather than presenting a finished product or performance.

Students demonstrated the collaborative nature of Drama as they participated in tableau challenges and group sculptures. These activities were a successful avenue to cultivate the students' teamwork, problem solving and creative thinking skills.

Through guided improvisation, students used the elements of dance to explore choreography and develop expressive skills. Parents enjoyed observing students mirroring kinaesthetic movements with a partner, whilst focusing on the spatial elements of dance. When reflecting on the task, students were invited to explain why they preferred to either lead or follow. Many students discovered their preference was to lead because they were in control of the movements and they liked to challenge their partner. Others preferred to follow and learn new ideas. The process of reflection deepened students' understanding of body, space, time and relationships, but also of their own learning style.

Our supportive family and friends discovered that Dance and Drama is stimulating, energetic and exploratory. They watched students take risks in a safe environment, express ideas through movement and awaken their creative capacity. With limited opportunities for students to perform over the past two years, students and visitors alike were grateful for the shared experience.

Community Engagement

Staff members have been involved in an Adaptive Leadership professional learning opportunity in 2022, with a focus on developing capacity to effect positive change and drive improvement within their section.

The Junior School (girls) cohort worked to reinvigorate engagement and connectedness. This has involved the establishment of the Community Engagement team. Its aims are to promote student and staff efficacy, provide opportunities for increased student voice and leadership, and to strengthen ties between students, staff and families.

Bike Education

As well as boosting muscle-flexibility and strength, the exercise helps postural balance and coordination that is necessary to every facet of a growing child's life and the sheer joy of movement, with wind in your hair and sun in your face, reduces stress and anxiety.

Whilst Bike Education in Year Five will not completely shift the mindset of some families, bringing bike-riding back into the curriculum will encourage parents to think about providing opportunities for their children to practise the skill. It is hoped that more students will commit to riding their bikes as they become more aware of the traffic and responsible users of the bike-paths and roads.

First Pivot,

Entrepreneurial Incursion

Year Five students recently participated in an insightful and engaging program delivered by 'First Pivot'. Across two consecutive sessions, the students came to understand that entrepreneurs see opportunity everywhere and that a problem or challenge is an opportunity to help people.

A professional coach in each class enabled students to learn skills such as optimism, self-motivation, combined with resourcefulness and resilience. Coaches worked closely with the students on ideation, opportunity analysis, and effective presentation skills.

Student teams worked to identify problems within our world such as, world hunger, gender inequality, life on land, sustainability. They worked together to brainstorm solutions, and then used their persuasive skills to communicate their ideas. Each group prepared and presented a 3-minute pitch with help and guidance from their coaches.

The winner at the Junior School (girls) was Team LAstraws with a pitch for a sustainable drinking straw that is made from pasta. "Because we all know that while paper straws are a step in the right direction, they still get soggy and don't work." There was some great competition with the runner-up proposing a 4-stage filter that can be fitted to existing cars to reduce emissions. At a cost of \$250 it pays for itself by helping you avoid visits to the doctor due to pollution-related illnesses.

It was wonderful to see the students come to the realisation that the goal is always for output of value to be greater than the input costs. The coaches helped the students to see that value can be measured in a variety of ways, including financial, social, environmental impact and happiness.

Science in the Junior School



The excitement of Science at Junior School is closely tied to the unfettered licence to ask lots of questions, and to explore them in fervent conversation with each other. At the Junior schools the services of a science laboratory have never been required to observe qualities, measure quantities, to sort, classify, to infer, predict, experiment, and to communicate in a range of topics that develop from the main strands of Biological, Physical, Chemical and Earth and Space Sciences.


Prep have been investigating how people ambulate by learning about voluntary and involuntary movements. They incorporated their toys into their investigations and explored how and what makes them move. The concept was extended in Year Four when students identified non-contact forces and began to appreciate that some interactions result from phenomena that can't be seen with the naked eye. They made predictions and formulated conclusions based upon their scientific investigations. The students then applied the knowledge learnt to a STEM challenge where they constructed a vehicle and competed in the Wacky Races challenge. The accompanying costumes led to added hilarity on the day!

Enquiring about the water cycle in Year Two prompted research and discussion about the responsible ways to utilise and save water, and more germane to the current La Nina cycle, how fresh water is generated through a water treatment plant.

In conducting experiments on solids, liquids and gases, Year Three used materials such as chocolate, honey, bicarb soda and water and practised writing scientific procedures. When asked for feedback on a recent lesson, Trinity responded with, "I really like that we are learning about the things around us." Lyla had the last word when she said, "I like it because we do fun experiments. It's fun!"

Pursuit of Excellence in Maths

With Mr Peter Maher and Ms Carlee Yuill at the Maths helm, pursuit of excellence in Maths is always in focus at the Essendon and Moonee Ponds Campuses.

In the APSMO Maths Olympiad, selected Year Six students competed in a series of five problem-solving quizzes. The boys' team finished in the top ten and the girls also in the top 10% of all teams entered; with Elisa Kurban scoring 24 out of a possible 25, and Princella Lam and Elsa Wu scoring 23:, Cara Gauci, Lily Wu, and Allegra Bui also finished in the top 10% and for the boys, Advik Gourisetty and Lachlan Huxley scoring 24 out of 25 and Krish Aggarwal, Jonathan Alexandrou, Joshua Bui, Jayden Ho, Alexander Li, Julian Nash and Alvin Nguyen all finished in the top 10%. Recognising the value of building confidence in problem-solving skills in a non-competitive arena, the rest of the students in Year Six had the benefit of participating in the APSMO Maths Games run concurrently with Maths Olympiad.

The Australian Mathematics Competition is open to students from Years Three, with students participating in the 30-problem challenge. Junior School students achieved 5 High Distinctions and 80 Distinctions, with Alice Chen, Year Three (girls), and Advik Gourisetty, Year Six (boys), receiving the Best in School Awards.

Teams of students from Years Three to Six at both Sections competed in inter-school Maths Games Days throughout the year and had the benefit of competition in an enjoyable series of problem-solving activities. All teams performed exceptionally well. The Year Three (boys) team finished third, while the Years Four, Five and Six Boys) teams finished first at each year level and Year Three and Year Five (girls) each achieved second place on the day.

Maths Talent Quest Success

The Maths Talent Quest is an annual competition by The Mathematical Association of Victoria which asks its participants to demonstrate that "mathematics is all around us". Our Junior Schools have a long history of achievement in this competition and this was evident once again in 2022.

Selected as State representatives in the national competition from Junior (girls) were: Scarlett Le and Evelyn Tran, Year Two, with an investigation of the costs of purchasing a pet, Their project won a National Prize for best group entry.

Chennya Fernando, Year Four, for her entry on making her kitchen sustainable, was Highly Commended. Ashleigh Tan, Year Six was awarded the Jim Trotter award for her entry entitled, UV exposure in my Daily Activity.

Two investigations from the Junior (boys) were also successful at national level: 'Train Turn Around Times Are Related to the Number of Passengers' by Sam Gilbertson, Year Three. Sam discovered that trains with two doors tended to load and unload faster than trains with three doors. He also learned that passengers with special needs made little impact on train turnaround times. Sam won a participation award in the National Quest.

Jayden Chan and Dang-Quan Le won best group entry at Year Five with 'Does Size Matter in Sport?' examining the relationship between physical attributes and sporting prowess with a survey of their classmates. Their data showed that size was not a major factor in soccer but was significant in basketball.

We congratulate Scarlett and Evelyn, Chennya, Ashleigh, Sam, Jayden and Dang-Quan.

There were very valuable and insightful discussions into the interdisciplinary approach required to tackle climate change, the role of science communication in managing public health issues, the barriers erected by inequitable access to research funding and, such as Dr Hyeon's advice about work ethic, words of wisdom on how to succeed as a curious team player, not only in the science industry but the workforce in general.

I feel very fortunate to have had an Olympiad journey and the opportunity to attend the Asian Science Camp, and I am indebted to my teachers, family, and friends for the support they lent me throughout the past year. I have learnt so many lessons that I will hold close to my heart.

For the first time since 2019 Year Twelve students, their parents and staff could attend the traditional sit-down Valedictory Dinner together.







Learning and thinking

Learning and thinking is not only central to one of the twin pillars of the school, it is the motivation for so much of what is offered to our community. We understand that high expectations drive development and growth in each student. Staff members are active members of our learning community and play an important role in the Culture of Thinking at PEGS.

Strategic objectives

- Set high expectations for all to promote intellectual engagement, complex problem solving, growth and self-awareness
- Use evidence-based strategies that drive academic and personal success
- Challenge every student to apply new knowledge through deep learning
- Use rigorous assessment practices and feedback to improve teaching and learning
- Cultivate tenacity, courage and drive

Research into student outcomes makes clear the impact that individual teachers have on growth in student learning. To this end, the school has prioritised teacher development by providing opportunities for teachers to learn from each other with resulting collective efficacy. In 2022, teaching staff at PEGS engaged in more than 11,000 hours of professional learning. The school engaged experts to focus on the key areas of improving student writing, authentic assessment, and adaptive leadership.

In 2022, students have been provided with opportunities to develop skills and dispositions that will be demanded of them by employers of the future. This year has seen increased opportunities for eLearning, with coding embedded in every subject across the curriculum. Select Year Seven students were trained as 'Microbit Champions' to support the learning of their peers, and an animation club was formed for Middle School students. All Year Five students were involved in an entrepreneurial studies programme focussed on ideation, innovation and communication skills

Recognition that quality feedback can significantly improve student outcomes has meant that this has been a focus of school improvement efforts this year. Under the guidance of Bronwyn Ryrie-Jones, Junior and Middle School teachers have been provided with Professional Learning opportunities in authentic assessment. Terri Campbell has also worked with staff this year on using feedback to improve student writing. Larkin Centre staff worked in faculty groups to complete a project looking at how to improve feedback to students. At Middle School, new reports were implemented with a focus on next steps for learning. At the Junior Schools, new practices are in place to better track student growth through discussion and analysis of formative and summative assessment.

The School has also created two new roles at the Junior Schools, Coordinators of Individual Needs, to provide increased support for students with individual needs. In addition, extra support has been provided through our Speech Therapists, and the School appointed a Health Administrator to oversee the support for students with serious health conditions and provide staff professional learning in this area to ensure equity in educational opportunities for students.

In the Middle Schools, a new subject, Numeracy+, was introduced as a means of providing numeracy support to students with an identified need in this area.





Care and wellbeing

We know that supporting the physical, social, emotional, psychological and spiritual wellbeing of an individual provides the ideal foundation for academic and vocational success.

In 2022, in addition to the obvious need to focus on Care and Wellbeing in the recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic, the launch of the Strategic Plan was an opportunity to revisit our approach with new vision and energy.

Strategic objectives

- Foster of a culture of individual and community care
- Identify and develop initiatives to support the wellbeing needs of students and staff
- Demonstrate our commitment to equality, diversity and inclusion

In July this year the new Child Safe Standards were implemented. After a period of consultation with staff, students, parents and caregivers, policies were reviewed and implemented, making way for professional learning for all staff and an ongoing commitment to educate all members of the school community about the new standards.

As part of this commitment we have engaged with Cyber Safety Project to support the amendments to the Online Safety Act. This project is ongoing and will include education sessions for staff and parents. Students in 2022 also received support via information sessions run by Victoria Police. Our eSafety resource page provides an online hub for staff, students and parents and caregivers to visit for current information and advice.

Our commitment to diversity and inclusion was further highlighted in 2022. In line with the Child Safe Standards, changes to online systems have been made to support students and staff with the use of their preferred pronouns and other practical resources to support gender diversity and inclusion have been implemented. Staff and parent education has been offered to the community, led by Clinical Psychologist, Dr Jacques Rizk. The Music department has also focussed on inclusive teaching with the view to addressing gender imbalance within ensembles.

Key actions from the Reconciliation Action Plan have been introduced during 2022. This has meant an increased presence and representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island People on both the committee and at culturally significant events at the school. National Reconciliation Week was celebrated with a deeper appreciation for Indigenous culture and enriched cultural awareness. This came about both through the implementation of the RAP and the inclusion of teaching about Reconciliation both formally and incidentally.

Student voice was promoted and celebrated at all sections of the school. Student focus groups were formed at Larkin Centre to reimagine the student leadership structure and process. A student leadership booklet has been drafted with a vision to implement the new structure in 2023. Students will be supported with leadership workshops as part of the wellbeing programme offered to all students at Year 11.

At the Middle Schools, steps have been taken to formalise the election process for student leaders. In conjunction with revised interview formats and questions these initiatives will provide greater transparency and feedback to all candidates and ensure that every voice is heard equally. This is mirrored in the process for appointing Sports Captains, where candidates go through a formal process of application, interview and feedback. In 2022, enhancement of the engagement and connectedness of the school community was crucial in the recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.



Engagementand connections

Strategic objectives

- Promote an environment of mutual respect
- Collaborate and share our story within and beyond the school community
- Build positive and productive relationships with parents and caregivers and alumni
- Promote a culture of open communication and feedback

Efficacy, regularity and timeliness were the motivation for the change from more traditional modes of communication to include the broader usage of PEGSpace in the form of PEGSpeak and the Newsfeed function. Through a rotating schedule of weekly posts, PEGSpeak has allowed the Principal, Vice Principal, Heads of Section, Directors and Chaplains to communicate our vision and objectives more thoroughly to parents and caregivers. It is anticipated that the functionality of PEGSpace will be further broadened in 2023.

Parents and caregivers have connected with school programmes through increased accessibility and attendance at school events at all sections of the school. Several new opportunities for parents to engage with school programmes have been added this year at all sections, such as open classrooms and an open Year Twelve Colours Assembly, to ensure that the connection between home and school remains strong.

The strength of connection has also been a priority for the alumni organisations. The inaugural meeting of the Alumni Community Hub took place this year and brings together the Former Students Association, PEGS Business Network, Friends of PEGS, affiliated sporting groups and the school board. This hub has been established to streamline the use of resources to create a more engaging experience for the alumni community. Maintaining special interest relationships in the PEGS alumni community has begun with the development of the Alumni Drama Group.

The School has also strengthened its connections between alumni and current students and school programmes. The relationship with the PEGS Hockey Club has been strengthened and they have been engaged to provide coaches for current school teams. Alumni have also assisted current Years Ten and Eleven students to consider their pathways, with career and tertiary study workshops and Q&As.

Considerable time has been devoted to strengthening the connection that the Kindergarten shares with the rest of the school community. In addition to stronger communication ties, a kindergarten uniform has been designed and is offered for purchase to the 2023 cohort of students. We look forward to the uniform being a strong visual reminder of the relationship that our Kindergarten students and their families have with the school community.

To ensure our learning community continues to flourish and grow, prudent management of physical, environmental and financial resources is imperative. Our commitment to being socially responsible and at the forefront of best practice secures our present and future.





Continuity and sustainability

Strategic objectives

- Embrace environmental, social responsibility and governance (ESG) best practice to ensure our school is sustainable for the future
- Ensure we follow best practice in compliance, and financial and risk management to continue to flourish regardless of external impacts
- Maintain the recruitment and development of outstanding and diverse staff
- Continuously develop resources and create assets, including ICT and facilities

We are seeking ways to reduce our carbon footprint and be more sustainable, led by our Resource Smart Schools Committee and our Conservation Club. Food waste bins can now be found at all sections at Keilor East Campus. A food waste program is taught as part of the Year Six camp curriculum. Students planted enough trees at Keilor Park to offset our school's paper usage. In partnership with Cranbourne Botanic Gardens the school has Raising Rarity garden beds at two campuses, where students propagate and monitor the rare daisy, Swamp Everlasting, which will build up an important reserve in the Victorian Conservation Seedbank for this endangered species.

Student activities are being supported by school administration and facilities staff, with a rolling transition to LED lights to reduce power usage, the planned installation of 78 solar panels on the social club roof as part of the renovation project in December 2022. With the use of solar energy, the social club will become self-sufficient and reduce power usage to a minimum. In addition, paper systems for intakes, receipting and scholarships have transitioned to electronic systems, creating environmental benefits plus efficiencies both in terms of time and cost. The process of converting all hard copies of application for admissions, reports, NAPLAN results etc. is complete and these are now stored electronically.

With the School Master Plans for Essendon and Moonee Ponds campuses in need of revision, the School Board, with the support of school management, has engaged consultants to assist with this process. The planning team has made good progress in 2022, with asset assessments, heritage surveys and traffic surveys being conducted, with the view to taking the plans to the community and council in early 2023.

The school was subject to a review by the Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority (VRQA) of its compliance with the Minimum Standards for School Registration. The Minimum Standards cover school governance, enrolment, curriculum and student learning, student welfare, staff employment and school infrastructure. There are also specific requirements related to bushfire preparedness (Eildon campus), anaphylaxis management, financial management and the Child Safe Standards. The outcome of the review was that the VRQA is satisfied that the School has demonstrated compliance with the standards assessed as part of this review. Our next review is scheduled for 2026.
